

Obituary I Did It My Way.....



Fifty seven years ago, Wayne Adams, the youngest of three children was born to Mario Elwollis Adams and Doreen Christalia Thomas Adams on Friday, July 12, 1963.

I did it my way... "I wanted to be a historian from the time I was eight years old. My mother bought me a book listing all the presidents of the United States while attending Jane E. Tuitt Elementary School. I learned the presidents by heart and was able to say their names in order of the time they served."

Wayne's educational journey contributed to his love for History and politics. He attended the Jane E. Tuitt Elementary School from 1968-1975; the Wayne Aspinall (nee Adelita Cancryn) Junior High School from 1975-1977 and the Charlotte Amalie High School from 1977-1981, graduating in the top 10 of his class in 1981, all three schools in St. Thomas, Virgin Islands. He studied Sociology with a concentration in History for two years at the College of the Virgin Islands (now University of the Virgin Islands) before going on to further his studies at Jacksonville University in Jacksonville, Florida.

I did it my way... "I got fed up with College and I was getting ill, so I decided to quit. At that time I had a 3.04 grade point average and said to myself, 'let me bail out of here.'"

In his early teen years at the age of 15, Wayne was diagnosed with the mental illness of manic depression, also known as bipolar disorder. Though he struggled with his mental illness for many years, he did not allow his illness to deter him from accomplishing many notable goals. He always credited the unconditional love and support of his parents, Mario and Doreen Adams and his faith in the Lord Jesus Christ for him making it through his struggles.

I did it my way... "because of my attention to facts, dates and details, I was given the name "Facts Man" by Reginald "Ras Regg" Martin in October of 1988. The name caught on and it became my moniker."

Yes, Wayne "Facts Man" Adams struggled with his illness of manic depression but in spite of it he pressed on and accomplished lots:

- In 1984 at age 21, he became the youngest person in the U.S. Virgin Islands history to run for a senatorial position in the V.I. Legislature, though unsuccessfully. "Facts Man" also ran in the years 1990; 1996 and 2002, he again ran unsuccessfully.
- He became politically savvy and knowledgeable while working under the tutelage of then Senators Iver Stridiron, Adelbert Bryan and Virdin Brown.
- He established his publishing company, The Historic Institute in 1988. Through his
 publishing company "Facts Man" produced historical booklets, CBS, tapes and posters.
 Posters on notable Virgin Islanders such as former Governor Cyril E. King; WSTA radio



- He established his publishing company, The Historic Institute in 1988. Through his
 publishing company "Facts Man" produced historical booklets, CDs, tapes and posters.
 Posters on notable Virgin Islanders such as former Governor Cyril E. King; WSTA radio
 personality Irvin "Brownie" Brown and Senator Ruby M. Rouss.
- Led in 1992, 1995, 1997 and 2001 respectively the successful, international fights to prevent Britain, France and Japan from transshipping deadly, nuclear waste through the Caribbean.
- "Facts Man" was honored on Sunday, August 17, 2003 by the St. Thomas based organization, The African Diaspora Youth Development Foundation, Inc. with the Carlos Cooks Achievement Award for an outstanding black business person within the U.S. Virgin Islands.
- He was honored on Saturday, October 13, 2007 by the political party, namely, the Independent Citizens Movement (I.C.M.) Party of the Virgin Islands for dedication, loyalty and determination to enlighten the community. Also by the mental health advocacy group NAMI-VI for helping the community to better understand the effects of mental illness.
- His love for travel took him to the African countries of Liberia, Zambia and Zimbabwe; Caribbean Islands of Grenada and Jamaica. Often times on his global travels "Facts Man" sought out and met with many of the countries respective leaders.

And so it was, Wayne "Facts Man" Adams truly did it his way. Rest in eternal peace, our dear son and brother.

Tribute to Wayne "Facts Man" Adams

I join the Virgin Islands community in expressing my deepest sympathy to the Adams family on the passing of Mr. Wayne "Facts Man" Adams at the age of 57. Against great challenges, he was one of the most creative and resourceful persons I have met. A staunch community and political advocate, he provided insights on regional and world affairs.

I could always count on him for his latest publications and CDs on various subject matters relating to the African diaspora. He was always willing to share his travel experiences and insights as he navigated the Territory and the region in search of truth and understanding.

Adams was a walking encyclopedia, hence his nickname, bestowed by the Legislature's own Reginald Martin. He had a gift for remembering dates, times, names, and circumstances of the past. The community embraced his knowledge. He was a frequent guest on WSTA 1340 AM radio, who shared with his listeners snippets of facts about various personalities who shaped Virgin Islands history.

When off the radio, he offered his recollections on the streets to those who would listen, or by selling his self-published booklets and albums through the Historic Institute. The flipside to his genius was a man who also struggled with bipolar disorder, who spoke openly about his condition and in doing so became an advocate for spreading awareness of the limited support services for mental illness in the Virgin Islands. He credited his faith and loving parents for helping him make it as far as he did in life. His mother, Doreen Adams, preceded him.

A product of the public school system, Adams graduated in the top ten of the Charlotte Amalie Class of 1981, according to an old newspaper feature. He pursued sociology and history at the College of the Virgin Islands, and further studies at Jacksonville University in Florida.

His interest in politics led him to run for office on several occasions. Even when not on the ballot, he would hand deliver his handwritten predictions, complete with forecasted vote tallies and anticipated Senate officers, during the election season. He was a strong proponent of the Virgin Islands strengthening its ties with the Caribbean region by joining CARICOM. He liked calypso music and danced and sang to it with abandon. In his chants laid over a rhythm, he philosophized about serious world issues, remembered historic leaders, and spoke to topics in between.

Remarkably, despite setbacks and personal quirks, he committed to give so much of himself to benefit the Virgin Islands. We will miss his voice and creativity. On behalf of myself, family, and staff, I offer condolences. Job well done, good and faithful servant!





Like a bird from prison bars has flown, I'll fly away.


